UUWF to Commission 2012 Equity & Justice and Margaret Fuller Projects

o enhance UU Women's Federation's participation in the theme of the Unitarian Universalist Association's special 2012 justice General Assembly, the UUWF will this year focus two of its three grants programs on the GA theme by commissioning this year's funded projects.

"Given our mission, the way our funding programs support it, and the GA theme of furthering the rights of immigrants – both documented and undocumented – and indigenous peoples," said UUWF President Rev. Marti Keller, "this is a good fit for all of us."

The UUWF's Equity and Justice grants, she went on to explain, support one part of the Federation's organizational mission – advancing justice for women and girls. Potential 2012 Equity and Justice projects, she said, include UU justice projects with a direct, positive impact on the lives of immigrant and/or indigenous women and girls. "This could be a local congregation working in partnership with a reproductive health clinic serving the unique needs of these populations," she said, "or with literacy or life skills projects serving immigrant women and girls."

The UUWF's Margaret Fuller grants support the other part of the UUWF's mission – promoting the spiritual growth of women and girls. "It's particularly relevant that within a decade of its founding as the Feminist Theology Awards," Rev. Keller said, "this program was revisioned and renamed to embrace a wider and richer variety of woman-centered theologies and spiritual practices."

The revisioned program, she said, is inclusive of those who describe themselves using such terms as womanist, eco-feminist, or mujerista. "We'll be looking for 2012 Margaret Fuller projects that deepen our appreciation and understanding of woman-centered religious beliefs or spiritual practices of immigrants and indigenous cultures." Since UUWF will commission this year's Equity and Margaret Fuller Projects, no unsolicited proposals will be considered this year. Plans are to identify at least one project each for the two programs in time for announcement at GA.

"Our goal is to identify and fund the best possible UU projects directly related to the intersection of our mission and the justice GA theme," Rev. Keller said. "Because of this our funding programs will function proactively rather than reactively this year. Instead of limiting ourselves to consideration of proposals submitted to us, we use our established networks within the UU community to identify such projects."

Meet Jessica Halperin, the new UUWF Clara Barton Intern for Women's Issues

Editor's Note: The UUWF Clara Barton Internship for Women's Issues was established in 2002 in the UUA's Washington Office by UUWF's \$200,000 donation and assistance to the UUA in raising a matching amount for the permanent endowment that funds the internship. In Summer 2010, staffing of this position was temporarily suspended as the UUA revisioned its approach to public policy work. The new internship position changes the title and moves the position's emphasis from direct advocacy at the federal level to providing resources and opportunities for congregations and their leaders to advocate for issues specific to women.

Greetings from Washington! Congress is in session and the city is bustling. It's a good day to be a Unitarian Universalist advocate in the nation's capital. In the short time since I began as the Program

Associate for Women's Issues at the UUA's Washington Office, I've attended coalition meetings, briefings on Capitol Hill, and congregational activities; it's been an inspiring trial-by-fire in this field of faith-based advocacy and organizing.

I am honored to work on such important issues as reproductive justice and government support for low-income women, and I look forward to partnering with UUs across the country to help make our society safer, more compassionate, and more just for women.

Unfortunately, now is a time when this country is neither particularly safe nor just for women. Not since *Row v. Wade* in 1973 have reproductive rights been under so much attack from politicians hoping to turn their paternalism into law and women, especially low-income women, have yet to see any substantial recovery from the Great Recession of 2008. My hope is that we as Unitarian Universalists will have a positive impact on proposed legislation as it comes up at the state level or here in Washington. I'll be working to build that capacity through four main aspects.

First, I am compiling a core of relevant information on these issues that will be available on the UUWF's website (but don't look now – I've only just started) so that our faithful voice can be heard by anyone with internet access.

Second, I'm keeping in regular contact with UU reproductive justice advocates via a weekly listserv featuring news and action items. Email me (jhalperin@uua.org) to sign up.

Third, I look forward to hosting conference calls, webinars, and other events to connect you – leaders in UU congregations – to other UUs working for women's justice so we can exchange strategies and inspiration.

Finally, I will be personally wading into politics in Washington: speaking with members of Congress, signing our name on coalition letters to Capitol Hill, and working with interfaith progressive lobbyists to realize our vision for a better world.

I need your help every step of the way.

I know that UUWF members and their passion for justice created my position in Washington, and I'm grateful. And I'm asking for more. Constituent communications and lobby visits mean more to Congressional offices than do the efforts of professional lobbyists, and it will be your letters to the editor, your questions at candidate forums, and your activism that will make a difference.

I am looking forward to working together.

he UUWF's Clara Barton Sisterhood was founded in 1969 as a way for women's groups, congregations and other individuals and organizations to honor women aged 80 and over for their contributions to their congregations and communities.

Why women aged 80 and over? The Sisterhood is named in honor of Universalist Clara Barton, born on Christmas Day, 1821 in North Oxford, MA. Best known as founder of the American Red Cross, Barton's path toward that work did not begin until she was over 40 – in an era when many women did not live to reach that age.

Message from the UUWF President On Social Action via Cyberspace

ithin a few days of the story breaking that the Susan G. Komen Foundation had decided to end its funding of Planned Parenthood programs to screen and educate about breast cancer, women and men all over the country let their voices be heard – on the side of affordable, accessible health care – and against the exclusion of one of the largest providers of these services because it is pro-choice on the issue of abortion.

For as long as the UU Women's Federation has existed, women in our faith movement have called for reproductive justice and compassion. Consistently, when surveyed, they have asked that the UUWF work on this issue, as well as women's health care in general. So I was ready to issue a statement condemning the action of the Komen Board and asking UUWF members and others to join with me.

Then news came that the foundation had reversed its decision, due in no small part to the capability we now have to spread the word in cyberspace, through e-mail, websites, Facebook, Twitter and ever-emerging communication vehicles. The response was consistent and passionate and clear. My hope is that UUWF will be diligent, agile and eloquent as we continue to work toward equity and justice for women and girls.
